A look into the the Tri-County Toy Auction

The Tri-County Spring Toy Auction held March 24 offered over 1,000 lots of collectible toy tractors, airplanes, toy accessories and memorabilia.

The auction was held on Vernon Yoder's property northwest of Arcola and gathered people from all over the country. Cars with license plates from Indiana, Iowa, Missouri, Illinois and other states packed the green space of the farm. Where there wasn't a car, there were general auction items for Saturday, March 25. You could find all sorts of furniture, appliances and farm equipment.

Walking into the warehouse, you can see old signs, collectibles and keepsakes lining the walls. A table of all the lots, available for closer inspection, sat at the back of the warehouse and dozens of chairs and tables were set up in front of the auctioneer. The first thing you hear is an auctioneer chanting numbers and words rhythmically with a quick cadence, selling lots at breakneck speeds.

Auction Owner Vernon Yoder said he's held the Tri-County auc-

tion for the last 20 years, but has held auctions for 26 years.

"It's just a dream that I wanted to do," said Yoder.

The auctioneers work together to make the show run smoothly. They take turns selling lots to ensure their voices get a break from the near-constant chanting.

"This is a weekend I really look forward to," said auctioneer Calvin Miller.

Calvin has been working as an auctioneer since 2011. Auctions have been a constant in Calvin's life since he was young. He was always interested in them, as was his father, who got his license in 2008. Calvin helped his father with the auctions and eventually decided that he also wanted to start auctioneering. A "family auction" was held for Calvin to see if he'd be up to the task. Afterward, his father agreed with Calvin and sent him to auction school, where he learned his trade.

"You mainly go there to get the laws straight," said Calvin. "Chant is kind of your own thing."

The first year he started work as an auctioneer, he started as a bid-

spotter. He helped the auctioneer spot bidders in the large crowds to keep bidding running smoothly.

"They're a third hand to the auctioneer," said Calvin.

What makes a good auction is the variety of people there. Calvin

said some bidders are dealers who purchase lots for resale. Some people purchase them for museums and others purchase the toys for their private collections.
