Jean was born on January 13, 1924, in Humboldt, the third child of Paul Wamsley Poorman and Mary (Danner) Poorman. She was a descendent of John William Poorman, who settled in Humboldt Township in 1836, and of William Wamsley, Josephus Danner, and John McNutt, whose families migrated to West Coles County in the mid 1850s. Jean's family moved to Mattoon in 1927. She married Orwin Proctor "Proc" Johnston, Jr. in 1944. He preceded her in death in 1999.

As a Girl Scout, Jean's enduring love and knowledge of plants, animals and the outdoors began. Her lifelong enjoyment of singing, music and reading also began in childhood.

After farming for 30 years, Jean and Proc retired to Mattoon. They both enjoyed golf and travel to visit their children. After Proc's passing, Jean pursued her Master Gardener certification and remained active in Mattoon.

Jean was a member of the First United Methodist Church of Mattoon, The Literary Club

of Mattoon and Coles County Historical Society. She was one of four authors of "Mattoon... A Pictorial History" published in 1988.

In 2018, she moved to ClarkLindsey senior community in Urbana to be closer to her daughter and soon had new friends. Bill Henderson

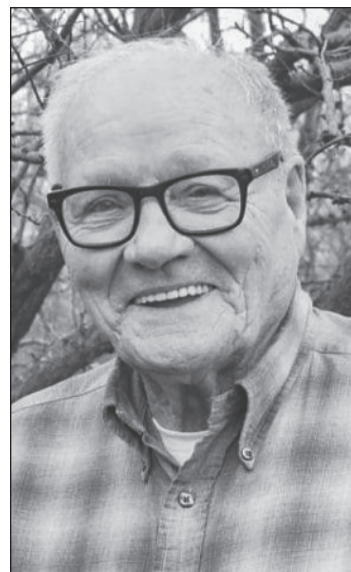
