My cousin called to say they have a four-day weekend and have decided to bypass the traditional family gathering and leave Thursday afternoon and drive to Mackinac Island, Michigan. Somehow she was able to get reservations, at this late date, for July 4th at the Hotel Iroquois, where we stayed many times. Luckily, the Iroquois is just a short distance from the famous and beautiful Grand Hotel and even though the Grand is sold out she was able to get dinner reservations there for the night of the 4th.

For those of you who are not familiar with the Grand Hotel, the movie "Somewhere in Time" starring Christopher Reeve and Jane Seymour was filmed there in 1980 and 1981 causing a rebirth of fame for the renowned coastal resort hotel and Island. The historic hotel was built in 1887 and has operated continuously since that time. At the time of opening the room rates averaged between \$3.00-\$5.00 per night and if you are lucky to reserve a room today that same room would cost between \$300.00- \$500.00 per night. The Musser family built the hotel and operated it for nine decades until selling it in 2019. The Grand still holds the distinction of having the longest porch in the world and having had the privilege of sitting in a

A trip to Mackinac Island is a dream vacation from the boat ride (which is both scary and exhilarating) across the Straits to the quaint town, which still does not allow cars to be driven on the island and you can't help but have a great time. Horseback, carriage and bicycles are still the mode of transportation and it works quite well for them. Shopping is very "touristy" but it is fun to explore both the gift shops and the stores where the locals shop. You may have heard of Mackinac Island fudge and the original "Mackinac Island Fudge Co", which opened in 1887, is still the best in my opinion and I have eaten fudge from all the different shops.

The hotels are pretty pricey but even a day trip is worth your time. We experienced spring, summer and fall on the Island and it is at the top of our list of beautiful trips. We had hoped to go for a winter trip and the latest we were

there was what they call closing weekend; all the hotels close for the winter because the straits freeze over and the only way to get there is by air or an ice boat. This should be really fun; we are cooking nothing but food from the 50's and most of the group has planned to wear 50's clothing. All of us were born in either 1946 or 1947 so we all call the 50's the best time of our childhood but I have to admit I have had a bit of trouble coming up with suitable attire. I found a pair of light blue "Burmuda" shorts and a white "Judy Bond" sleeveless blouse with

a "Peter Pan" collar at a thrift shop and decided to wear them instead of going the "poodle" skirt route. A couple of the ladies already told me they were wearing "house dresses" and "poodle" skirts and I wanted to be different. When I showed my Mom what I plan to wear she thought I had found the clothes in her closet. I did find an old apron in her closet so I think I will take it with me as well.

I will be making my favorite 50s picnic salad, Ambrosia salad also called 5 cup salad and all day baked beans with hotdogs. I have never figured out why Mom called the beans baked beans because they are cooked all day, the day before serving,

She would cook them all day, adding water if needed. She would refrigerate it over night and the day of the picnic she would add a package of chopped hot dogs and simmer until the hotdogs were cooked. I have made my baked beans this way my entire life with or without the hotdogs. I am also taking a couple cases of orange pop and "Squirt" if I can find them. We used to mix the "Fanta" or-

ange pop with the "Squirt" and make orange fizzies.

- Drained pineapple chunks, 1 cup

Summer solstice signals season's start

Even with a bright Moon in the sky this week, there's still plenty of things to see in our summer sky. Venus and Mars are still in the west and only about three degrees apart. Venus is quite obvious, but you may have to search for Mars above and left of Venus. Further to the upper left of Mars about seven more degrees is the heart of our spring celestial lion, the star Regulus. Regulus will be slightly brighter than Mars. Just a bit south of the point straight up is the orange star Arcturus. And this evening, a waxing gibbous Moon is to the left of the bluish star Spica in the south after sunset.

The Moon will be full Monday evening, rising in the southeast as the Sun sets. July's full Moon is the "Buck Moon." Around this time, new antlers of buck deer push out from their foreheads. It was also often called the Thunder Moon or Hay Moon. It'll bright-

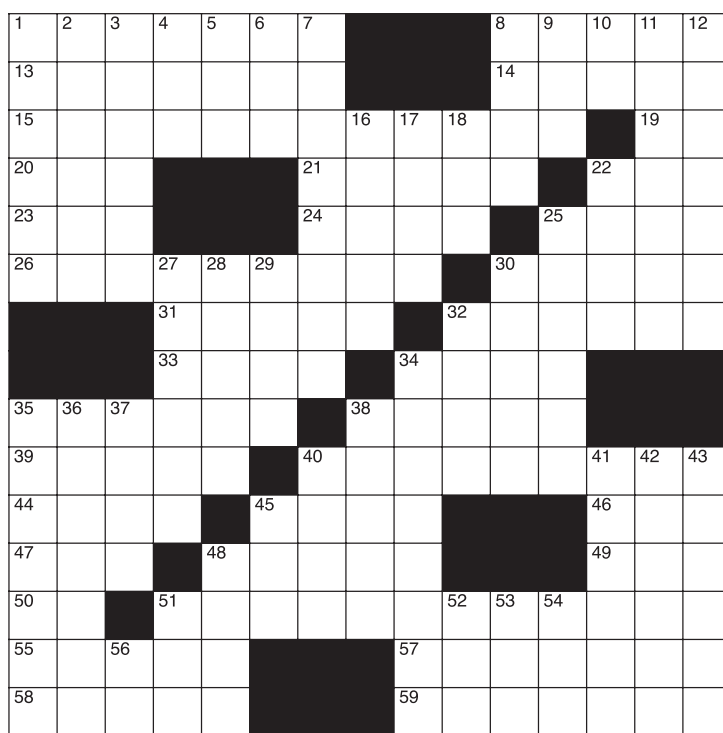

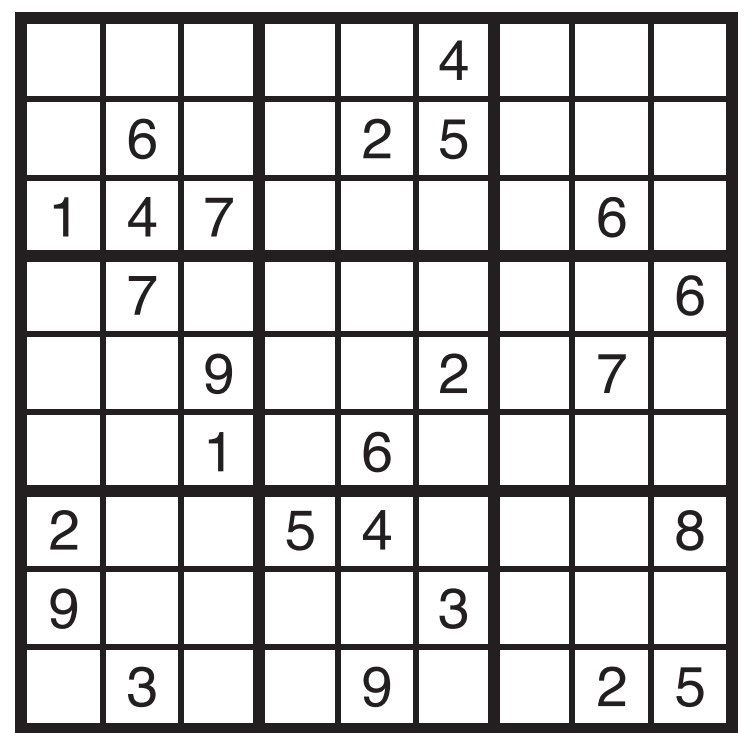
