

Arthur celebrates sesquicentennial during Cheese Fest

This year marks the 50th anniversary of the Arthur Amish Country Cheese Festival to be held on Saturday, Sept. 2 through Monday, Sept. 4.

On March 24, 1973, Erland Kondrup, owner of the Arthur Cheese Company, hosted an open house. There were free samples of the company's award-winning cheese, plant tours, and a no-limit Swiss cheese special at 94 cents per pound.

This year's event will keep many Cheese Festival traditions alive such as the free cheese giveaways, free submarine sandwiches, Cheese Eating Contest, Cheese Curling Competition, and the Cheese Carving Contest.

At 10 a.m. on Saturday, Sept. 2, there will be the Ceremonial Cutting of the Cheese. A large wheel of cheese will be sliced by guest cheese cutters. In the past, local politicians, athletes and other celebrities including Coach

Lou Henson of Fighting Illini fame, have been guest cheese cutters. This year, a person from the past, Michael H. Warren, founder of Arthur, will be cutting the cheese along with some of his descendants still living in Arthur.

The parade also kicks off on Saturday at 3:50 p.m. Tradition is that the parade starts at 3 plus one minute for every year the Festival has existed. It should be an extra-special parade with, hopefully, additional participation because of Arthur's Sesquicentennial.

Community worship service

A Community Worship Service is being planned by the Arthur Ministerial Association and local churches to celebrate Arthur's Sesquicentennial celebration during Cheese Festival weekend.

Everyone is welcome and local churches are encouraged to join this service if they

would like. The service will begin at 10 a.m. at Penn Station on Sunday, Sept. 3. We will give thanks to God and praise the Lord for the many years of Christian community we have had together here in Arthur for the past 150 years.

The Cowboy Church that meets at Penn Station will pro-

vide 30 minutes of music from 9:30 a.m. to 10 a.m. before the service. Refreshments will be served during that time so all are encouraged to come early and fellowship.

The 10 a.m. service will include participation from local pastors and churches. The Rev. Mike Johnson will be bringing the morning message. Mike was the long-time former pastor at Vine Street Christian Church in Arthur and is now retired and living in Indiana.

A short history of Arthur churches will be shared by Mayor Rod Randall and a couple of special music numbers will be shared as a part of this service as well.

An offering will be received for the Arthur Grade School Backpack program, which provides weekend food for children and families in our community.

Founders' Day dinner

Approximately 200 people will be on hand at the Founders' Day Dinner on Saturday, Sept. 2, at Penn Station in Arthur for a fun evening celebrating the 150th Anniversary of the founding of Arthur on Sept. 2, 1873.

There will be a display of Arthur memorabilia to view, video clips from the past to watch, music, and good fellowship.

This event will feature a grilled pork and grilled chicken dinner, birthday cake and ice cream, an interview with a

guest from the past – Michael H. Warren, entertaining Arthur history, and the opening of the time capsule from 1973.

Guests may begin gathering at 5:30 p.m. at Penn Station in downtown Arthur. The dinner will begin at approximately 6 p.m.

Those attending are encouraged to wear clothing representative of the time of Arthur's founding or of any other era that represents a time in Arthur's past.

The Founders' Day Dinner not only honors the founding of Arthur in 1873 by Michael Warren, but it also honors all those throughout Arthur's history who founded schools, churches, businesses, industries, parks and libraries, clubs and organizations, fire departments, police departments, and municipal government that have made this an exceptional community for 150 years.

Time capsule to be opened

At the Founders' Day Dinner, on Sept. 2, Arthur's time capsule will be opened and the contents that were placed inside it during the Village's 1973 Centennial Celebration will be revealed.

Progress Industries manufactured the welded-aluminum time capsule and it has been resting for fifty years in a concrete vault located in the floor of the Welcome Center since the time that building was constructed in 1973. The

vault was then covered by a granite stone that is engraved "Open in 2023."

During the Founders' Day Dinner festivities, the time capsule will be opened and the contents passed out to those present, or their family members, who can be identified as the proper recipients of the items. Unclaimed items at the dinner will be available a week or later at the Municipal Office.

After its opening, the time capsule and some of its miscellaneous contents will be on display at the Arthur Public Library.

In 1973, two sizes of envelopes, a \$5 envelope and a \$10 envelope, were sold to the public for placing items in the new time capsule. The money was used to help defray the costs of Arthur's Centennial Celebration.

Stamped on the outside of the envelopes was "Do Not Open until 2023" and, on the front of the envelopes, were hand-written names of those who were to receive these items.

In addition to these envelopes, there are reportedly other items placed inside the time capsule by the Centennial Committee.

The time capsule will be re-used and placed back into the vault at the Welcome Center sometime later this year. Before that, the public will have an opportunity to help fill the capsule with items for future Arthurites when it will be opened again in 2073.
