## Introducing Morgan Jones, Moultrie-Douglas UI Extension's new program coordinator

Moultrie-Douglas County 4-H Clubs will be celebrating National 4-H Week October 1-7 and several activities have been planned for this special event. This gives our newspapers an opportunity to introduce Morgan Jones of Tuscola as the University of Illinois Extension Program Coordinator for 4-H Youth Development for Moultrie-Douglas Counties.

Morgan started her job on a part-time basis in March of this year while she was working on her BS in Agricultural Leadership, Education & Communications at the University of Illinois. She graduated from the U of I in only 3 years in May and continued her job on a full-time basis.

Morgan is a 2020 graduate of Tuscola High School and resides in Tuscola. Much to my surprise, she said she has never been a member of 4-H, but was very active in FFA in high school and showed cattle at local, state and national level. The cattle were on her grandparent's farm. She said she showed at the Moultrie-Douglas County Fair when she was 11-12 years old, but not as a 4-Her.

Morgan is the daughter of Mimi and Jason Jones of Tuscola and granddaughter of Dave & Marcia Hackett, of Rural Tuscola.

While a student at U of I, she was on the livestock judging team. She did internships

with the following: Farm Bureau in Bloomington where she planned and executed the Master Showmanship at the Illinois State Fair in 2021; Trans-Ova Genetics at Sioux Center, Iowa, in marketing and communications where she traveled to five national cattle shows; Repro Logix at Ft. Scott, Kan., where she created content for social media.

Presently, Morgan is working on her Master's Degree in the same field as her BS Degree.

Morgan attended a statewide 4-H team meeting Monday through Wednesday of last week. All 27 4-H units came together at the University of Illinois totaling approximately 150 people. They discussed improving project books, in-school programming and maximizing 4-H experience.

During 4-H week, Morgan and her co-workers will be hosting 4-H open enrollment night and floral design workshop on Tuesday, Oct. 3, at 6 p.m. at the Moultrie-Douglas Extension Office, 304 E. Progress, Arthur. Please register by Sept. 30 to be guaranteed a spot for the floral workshop.

A new 4-H club was formed in Arcola on Sept. 2. Anyone interested in this club contact the Extension Office. They are in the process of planning several additional workshops in the coming months. On Achievement Night they will be communicating with local schools for spring programs.

Since 4-H began more than 100 years ago, it has become the nation's largest youth development organization. The 4-H idea is simple: help young people and their families gain the skills needed to be proactive forces in their communities and develop ideas for a most innovative economy. 4-H is open to all youth, you are el-

Although Morgan's background didn't actually include 4-H, she was involved in the next thing to it, FFA. She is a very talented young woman and is anxious to work with the youth to help enhance their lives and live by the 4-H pledge: "I pledge my HEAD to clearer thinking, My HEART to greater loyalty, My HANDS to larger service, and My HEALTH to better living, for my club, my community, my country, and my world."

## County Board approves bridge funding

The Douglas County Board approved the funding petition for two Garrett Township bridges. The first bridge, located at 380 East County Road 1350 North will be replaced for a total cost of \$57,095. The Board will provide half of the funding at \$28,547.

The second bridge, located

at 1305 North County Road 450 East, will cost a total of \$54,053. The Board will pay \$26,256.

The Board approved adopting three collective bargaining agreements for the Douglas County Sheriff's Office. The first agreement for deputy sergeants and lieutenants, the

second for deputy officers below sergeant and the third for corrections officers and corrections sergeants.

Douglas County Sheriff Nathan Chaplin said the bargaining agreements are the third iteration of the bargaining unit's
