Administrator Jacki Athey noted that she had been working on merging water and sewer funds into the general account. She also noted that she had been in contact with the Douglas county engineer regarding repairs to the Front Street bridge, and that he is working with public works toward a permanent solution. She also noted that the bridge had been inspected in

Ianuary and that she was awaiting a revised estimate of the cost of needed repairs. Finally, she noted that she had been in touch with Jake Wolfe about consulting work on both the Front street bridge and survey work at Richman Park for future road expansion and improvements.

Public Works Director Mixell noted that road repairs were ongoing in the Pheasant Pointe subdivision. He also noted that the street sweeper needed new brushes, and a consensus was given to purchase and install parts as needed. He then stated that he had received a bid for stripping and waxing the Zest For Life Center floor, and that work would begin as soon as feasible. Finally, he noted that they were continuing to get bids on the installation of new, accessible doors for the center.

Mayor Eversole Gunter reported that she had been in recent contact with the rodeo organizers and that they are still very interested in bringing their rodeo to Villa Grove.

demic halted large scale events in 2020 and 2021. The dance returned in 2022 with plans to be held outdoors; weather moved the dance into the community building.



Villa Grove Basketball: A 100-year look back to the state championship

The year was 1923. The decrease in demand for agricultural products following the end of World War I had put rural America on its heels, after several years of boom times. Many farmers, who had borrowed to purchase more land to meet the insatiable demands of a world at war, found themselves holding deeds to properties that weren't worth as much as they owed. Commodity prices plummeted, leading to mass foreclosures, a sign of the great depression to come.

Villa Grove, with its rail-

based economy, seemed to be weathering the storm as well as it could. Numerous shops along the main street plied their wares. The Star Theatre had a full roster of vaudeville and musical acts performing weekly.

And then there was the high school basketball team. For a magical few weeks in March, the Grovers were the talk of the state, as they plowed their way through the district and sectional tournaments, all the way to the State Championship, where they defeated Rockford 32-29.

Tom Bretz's grandpa, Er-

nest Combes, was the captain of the team, and Tom recently shared some of his memorabilia about the big tourney run, and the following is a recap of the games the team won to reach the pinnacle.

Bill Barmore, Mike Reynolds, Ernie Combs, Harold Sanders and Wayne "Hulk" Hulse were the starters for Villa Grove. They were also the finishers, as they played every minute of every game during the tournament. Of course, in those days, the court was shorter and there was a jump ball after every made basket, including free
