throws, so there were plenty of opportunities to grab a quick rest, unlike today's relentless 90 feet of constant movement. The coach, Curtis Pulliam, was a devout man who drove his team hard because he believed that they had a chance to win it all, according to Mike Reynolds in

an article in the March 17,

1983, Journal Gazette news-

paper. "He thought we had a

chance, and he kept telling us

we did," Reynolds said.

The team's odvssev started with a 37-9 win over Fisher and a 43-4 shellacking of St. Joseph to earn a spot in the district final versus Urbana. According to the Villa Grove News report from the contest, "This was a hard-fought battle marked by unnecessary roughness and slugging on the part of Urbana's five as they realized that victory was slowly but surely slipping from their grasp." The Villa Grove quintet maintained their composure and won by a 16-9 score. Barmore, the team's star, netted 10 of the squad's points, with Hulse contributing 4 and Reynolds two, after he had been "knocked loopy" in the fourth quarter. "I saw three baskets and aimed for the middle one," Reynolds quipped. Guards Sanders and Combs were the defensive stalwarts for the team,

limiting Urbana to 4 field

goals in the entire game. The Grovers then moved on to sectional play, where they defeated Taylorville 28-19 and Mason City 35-13 before edging Mt Pulaski 17-16 in the final to earn a berth in the state finals in Champaign. According to the Villa Grove News, the Taylorville game was marred by controversy surrounding Tuscola's coach. "About the rottenest piece of work was the one pulled off by the Tuscola Coach, who seemed to do everything in his power to satisfy his desire to see Villa Grove lose the game on Friday night. He was discovered by some of our boys, apparently tipping off to Taylorville some of the methods Villa Grove used in their playing. When it became known what he had done, he certainly was given a warm reception, but such things as he pulled off down there are only a few of the deals he made to see Villa Grove beaten at nearly all of the games they played."

The Villa Grovians then home at 3:30 a.m., and for a moment, they were kings of moved to the State semifinal contest in Champaign, versus the basketball universe. Canton. It was reported that over 200 people from Villa Grove, ten percent of the town's population, boarded

started no player over 5 ft

10 and a half but countered

their lack of height by being

extremely quick and supe-

rior passers. The game itself

was a masterpiece, with one

writer calling it "The greatest

final in Illinois high school

Grove managed to grab a 9-8

lead after one quarter, but

Rockford was up for a battle

and the game stayed tight,

with Villa Grove holding a

slim 23-21 as the final quar-

ter started. Opening the final

stanza with a burst, Rock-

ford jumped out to a 26-23

lead. Sensing that the game

was getting away from them,

Captain Ernie Combs called a

rare timeout. "Coach Pulliam

didn't believe in using time-

outs. He said, 'Let the other

guy take time out.' As re-

ported in the Journal Gazette

Article, in the huddle, Combs

was emphatic. "Give it to our

best man. Give it to Bill and

let him shoot, and we'll get

out of this somehow." For his

part, Barmore stepped up,

scoring the final nine points

of the night for Villa Grove, to

finish with 22 for the game.

Reynolds chipped in 8 and

Hulse scored the remaining

bucket. The defense held

Rockford to 3 points the rest

of the way and wrapped up a

32-29 win. David had indeed

The game had long-term effects on many of its participants. Reynolds went on to play at the University of Illinois for four years after Coach Mike Ruby secured a job for him. He turned that education into a 42-year career in personnel with Goodyear Tire & Rubber and retired in Cuyahoga Falls, Ohio. Barmore, too, played two years at Illinois before starting a career in labor relations at U.S. Steel that lasted for 30 years. Of the starting quintet, only Combs moved back to Villa Grove, where he worked for the C&EI railroad and ran the water and filtering plant for the city before he passed away in 1972. Harold Sanders, the only junior among the starting 5, worked for 42 years for Pure Oil and Union Oil companies in Joliet before

retiring. As for the players, they were proud of their accomplishments as a team, but remained humble about their individual accomplishments. Barmore, the only member of the team to be selected for admission into the Illinois Basketball Hall of Fame and was adamant in his 1983 Journal Gazette interview. "Don't get the idea that I was the tournament," Barmore stated. "

It took all of us and I'm the first guy to say that. That was my night. That's all."

For his part, Combes too, remained proud, as evidenced by the treasure trove of collectibles about that magical March, but his grandson doesn't remember him ever boasting.

"I don't remember him talking about it too much," Bretz said. "It just wasn't a big deal to him." One thing that stood out to him? Tuscola's coach, trying to help Villa Grove's opponents. "He definitely talked about that," Bretz stated.

Heroes and villains. David and Goliath. Treachery from a county neighbor and a pint-sized hero who couldn't miss when it meant the most. This saga had it all, and even a century later, the story of Villa Grove's unlikely run to a state title, over the biggest name in the high school game, remains a legendary tale worth re-telling and celcrowd when they arrived ebrating.
