This annual celebration marks those who have impacted the organization and the communities it serves over the years while also awarding a host of scholarships to its Young Adults Committee members.

"A pioneer is described as someone who sees potential to solve a need and is willing to try new things to achieve that," explained Dan St. Peters of the Growth Association's board as the award was presented. "Over 46 years ago, award winner Margarette Trushel saw a need in our community, and that she had the potential to comfort, console and counsel those with this need."

Sponsored by 1st MidAmerica Credit Union, Beverly Farm Foundation was next presented with the Perseverance Award. This award recognizes "the continued effort to do or achieve something despite difficulties, failure or opposition," said St. Peters. Beverly Farm has served its families and the area for the past 125 years. Accepting the award for the organization was its CEO, Crystal Officer.

There were two Captain Awards presented this year. These awards are presented to an area business or gover mental body for their efforts to improve the quality of life in the Riverbend region. The first Captain Award, sponsored by CEFCU, was presented to Old Bakery Beer Co. and its owners, Lauren Pattan and James Rogalsky. The second Captain Award, sponsored by Werts Welding and Tank Service, was presented to the City of Wood River. Mayor Tom Stalcup accepted the award on behalf of the city. 
