Kentucky Labor Force estimates released last week show the county with one of the highest rates in the ten-county Lake Cumberland region.

McCreary County tops the area list with a 7.3 percent unemployment rate, Wayne County follows with a 6.8 percent rate, and Clinton County reports a 6.7 percent

(Both Clinton and parts

of Wayne were designated in 1993 as "Empowerment Zones"-economically distressed communities designated by government for

Rounding out the list is neighboring Adair at 6.2, Pulaski, 5.9, Casey, 4.9, Cumberland, 4.8, and Green and Taylor at 4.7.

With a Civilian Work Force (CFL) of 6,469 in Russell County as of February 2024, an estimated 6,048 people are employed, the Kentucky Center for Statistics said.
