Ham supper fundraiser

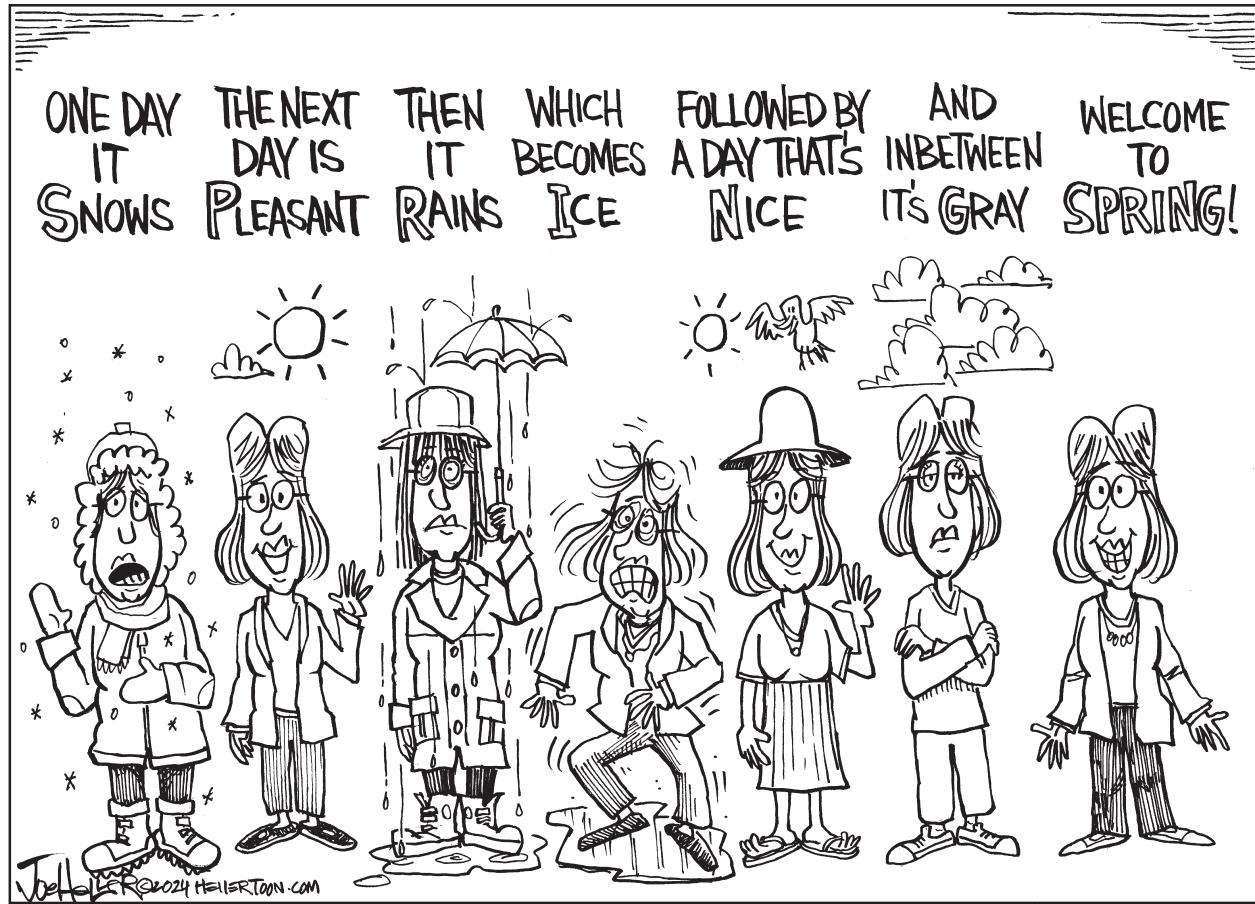

April is Awareness and Prevention Month

The therapist said to me: "You need to learn to trust again." When she said this just moments after I admitted I had been sexually abused as a child by a man I trusted. I felt she didn't understand the depth of my fear, disgust, anger, and helplessness. Anonymous Survivor

In my personal experience and understanding, I am a survivor of multiple traumatic events. As a survivor, I have spent my professional career researching, educating and speaking my truth. April is the annual awareness month for sexual assault survivors and child abuse preven-

tion month.

According to the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, Kentucky has one of the highest rates of sexual assault and child abuse. As an assault victim, I know the trauma can have many lasting effects and consequences on one's life without trauma intervention.

As a therapist for The Adanta Sexual Assault Resource Center (ASARC), this program provides services for child and adult victims of sexual assault. Specifically, the Lake Cumberland Children's Advocacy Center (LCCAC), offers services for child sexual assault victims. Services from ASARC and LCCAC are free through national and state grants. The need is great; if you or someone you know needs services, please reach out for help.

Public awareness, education, prevention, early intervention and trauma-centered treatment are necessary to break the cycle of violence that no one wants to talk about. We need to intensify efforts to expand the availability of trauma-informed care. Trauma-informed care means treating a whole person, considering past trauma, the resulting symptoms and adapted coping mechanisms due to the pain and move past the trauma to healing.

It is time for all to stand up and not allow the abuse of a single person. Everyone should practice empathy and tolerance because you never know what someone has been through. If you are or someone you love needs help, please get the help needed. There is help

for victims and anyone seeking help can get mental health services through telehealth from the privacy of home. The year of Covid-19 had one great outcome; mental health and trauma informed care services can be accessed with a phone call. So, reach out and get help.

Remember Psalm 147:3, "He heals the brokenhearted and bandages their wounds".
