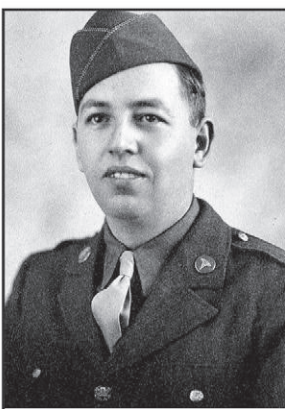

Pfc. Virgil Riley

Pfc. Virgil Riley, son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Riley of Hawesville, died on the 19th of last November, of wounds received on Leyte Island. Pfc. Riley was inducted into the Army on July 13, 1942, and received his basic training at Ft. Sill, Okla.

He then went to Ft. George G. Meade, Mr., from which point he went overseas in December, 1942. After he arrived overseas he was transferred from the Infantry to the Medical Corps.

Besides his parents, he is survived by four brothers, Pfc. John Riley, now in France, Barney Riley, Cannelton, Sam and Kirby Riley, Tell City; three sisters, Mrs. Grace Harris, Cannelton, Mrs. Maude Adkins, Lewisport, and Mrs. Cova Howell, Grandview, Ind.

DIES FROM WOUNDS

A War Department telegram received on July 25 by Mrs. John W. Pate, of near Lewisport, stated that Sgt. John W. Roberts, a Paratrooper, had been slightly wounded in France on June 24. Then on August 11, another telegram came saying that he had died on June 25 as result of wounds received in action in France.

Sgt. Roberts, the son of Claude Roberts of near Lewisport, would have been 28 years of age in October, and had been in the Army nearly ten years.

KILLED IN ACTION

Word has been received from the War Department by Mrs. Zeffie Whistle of Skillman, that her son, Pfc. Hazel Whistle was killed in action October 28 on Pelelui Island in the Southwest Pacific.
