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Glaze stated "either the committee needs to run the park or the city. Otherwise, what is the point of the committee?"

Mayor Tom Kennedy apologized for the misunderstanding and said that is why he wanted the council to clean up the language in the rules, so there weren't these kinds of misunderstandings in the future.

Council member Amanda Webb addressed the people in attendance at the meeting concerning her vote to not allow the Mother's Day event.

"I make the decisions I make based on my life experiences and I thought the event was larger than the

location could hold," Webb said.

In other action from the meeting, the council:

- Approved the agenda for the May 21 meeting.
- Approved the minutes from meetings on May 5, April 9, and April 27.
- Heard from Tracy Thomas with the Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Committee to ask the council for approval for a Juneteenth celebration. The property to be used for the celebration is owned by the Housing Authority and did not need approval from the city. Thomas has already secured permission from the Housing Authority.
- Heard from Trevor Posley, asking permission to

use Pea Ridge Park for an event to be held on Father's Day, Sunday, June 21. Mayor Kennedy asked Posley to bring it back before the committee at their June meeting, and get a list of vendors for the city to approve.

• Heard from Valentino Brockington of the Homerville Police Department. Brockington said the police department doesn't want to keep people from having events. Their concern is safety, Brockington said.

• Webb gave a report about the sign for Pine Forest Cemetery is being worked on, and should be up soon. from the March 26 meeting.
