AJ assistant hired as interim coach

Andrew Jackson has named assistant coach David Moore to be the interim head football coach for 2010, a move AJHS principal Mary Barry believes will enable the program to have stability and time to evaluate options for a permanent coach search.

Moore became the leader of the Volunteers after Brian Wilson accepted the job and then resigned 16 days later to become an assistant coach at Catawba College, where he

played football. Moore, a 1980 graduate of the school, expressed interest in leading the Vols in the previous two seasons in 2008 and 2009.

"We've asked assistant coach David Moore to serve as interim head coach because we see it as the best way to ensure continuity for the players and for the program,"

Barry said. "Coach Moore has a wealth of experience, and during the last two seasons, he's expressed a strong interest in leading the program. He's committed to working hard to give our players a successful season, and he has great ideas for moving the program forward."

Moore has served as head football coach at three schools in the past - Lower Richland High, Lincoln High and Stott's Branch High. He's also served as athletic director and head football coach in two middle school programs and as an

assistant coach in a number of other varsity programs and at the collegiate level.

Moore says he is excited about helping Andrew Jackson build on its great football tradition.

"I know the players here - we have a lot of talented athletes who want a chance to prove themselves on the field," Moore said. "We also have great support - both from the school administration and from the community - and a talented and experienced

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Old Jail building has roof damage

Another Robert Mills designed building in Lancaster County is in danger.

According to Jody Munsterlyn of the architectural firm Stricklin and Munsterlyn, significant structural issues have been discovered, making the building dangerous for the Lancaster County Emergency Management and Fire Service to remain there.

The ceiling is coming down and it's not safe to be in there. But it can be fixed," Munsterlyn said.

Munsterlyn's firm has been in charge of restoration at the old courthouse, also designed by Robert Mills.

According to Munsterlyn, he was asked by the county in 2007 to look at the jail to determine if any repairs needed to be made. He went in with a structural engineer and determined that a truss was needed.

Together, they were able to come up with a remedy. Munsterlyn said the condition of the building was not at a critical stage then.

Munsterlyn returned with the structural engineer three weeks ago and found more cracks which Emergency Management Director Monica Russell had reported. Munsterlyn said he expects the vibrating roller recently used to make repairs to West Gay Street caused the additional problems.

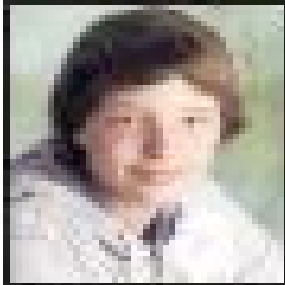
