

# Revolutionary War Soldiers buried in Spencer County Soil

**Peter Rasor-** (1758-1831) Hackelman Cemetery/Mt. Pleasant Cemetery, Grass Township; Sec. 29; CR. 200W; Proven Service Record, Military Stone. \*

**William Kelly-** (1760-1846) Kelly Cemetery, Hammond Township; Sec. 32; Finch Hill Route, Gordon King Property, Proven Military Record, Military Stone. \*

**Ludowick Davis-** (1764-1841) Kelly Cemetery, Hammond Township; Sec. 32; Finch Hill Route, Gordon King Property, Proven Military Record, Military Stone. \*

Stone placed at cemetery in 1989, after finding an old newspaper article listing his burial spot.

**Zachariah Briant/Bryant-** (1765- ca-1848) Kramer-Link Cemetery; Grass Township; Sec. 3, east side of Old State Road, 50W, Burroughs Farm. Proven Record, Military Stone erect in 1989.\*

**Thomas Jones-** (1751-1832) Brown Cemetery; Carter Township; Section 18; Lubbehusen Farm; east side of State Highway 68. Proven Service Record, Military Stone. \*

**James Jones-** (1760-1851) Half Brother to Thomas. Brown Cemetery; Carter Township; Section 18; Lubbehusen Farm; east side of State Highway 68. Proven Service Record, Military Stone. \*

**Thomas Blair-** (\_\_\_-1833)- Brown Cemetery; Carter Township; Section 18; Lubbehusen Farm; east side of State Highway 68. Proven Service Record, Military Stone. \*

**William Overlin-** (1765-1837) A Fifer. Bakers Creek Cemetery, Luce Township, Section 28, East side of CR 800 W. Proven Service Record, Military Stone \* Erected July 1, 1938

**Abraham Hornback-**(ca, 1758-1834) Bakers Creek Cemetery, Luce Township, Section 28, East side of CR 800 W. Proven Service Record, Military Stone \* Erected July 1, 1938

**Jesse Pry -** (1767-1847) Bakers Creek



Cemetery, Luce Township, Section 28, East side of CR 800 W. Military Stone,

**Benjamin Lamar-** (1760-1854) Buried in Bethlehem Baptist Cemetery, Hammond Township; Section 10, North of Highway 70, NW edge of Newtonville. Pasture Field of Thomas Farm. This tombstone was placed in New Hope Cemetery east of Newtonville, due to the fact that at the time Benno Schum got the stone order, Bethlehem Cemetery was to grown up to enter, so it was placed on a Peddicord Lot at New Hope Cemetery, east of Newtonville.

Willie Harlen, a Lamar decedent has acquired conclusive proof, of Benjamin's Military Record in recent years, this coming out of Georgia, Military Files, now in Spencer County Public Library. Has a tombstone, but not a Military Stone. Recently Proven.

**James Pollard-** (1762-1840) Mt. Zion

Church Cemetery/Conner Chapel; Clay Township, Sec. 12; Proven Service Record, Military Stone \*

**William Berry-** (1750-1819) Old Hamilton Cemetery / Berry Cemetery; Ohio Twp.; Section 35;

Proven Service Record, No Military Stone (1812 service insignia), On Dick and Janet Berry Farm, toward the River, east of the Rockport American Legion.

**David Chancellor-**(1749-1839), Chancellor Cemetery, Hammond Township; Sec. 18, CR 750N

Proven Service Record, Military Stone \*

**Thomas Turnham-** (1749-1834), Dale Cemetery, Carter Twp., Proven Service Record; Military Stone.\*

**Samuel Pendock-** (1766-1833) Dale Cemetery, Carter Twp., Proven Service Record; Non Military Stone, Tombstone reads "Revolutionary War Soldier". Listed in "Roster of Soldiers & Patriots of the American Revolution Buried in Indiana" under Crawford County.

**Jackson Masterson-** (1755-18?) Is a good possibly, said to be buried in Mt. Zion Church Cemetery. (John or Jackson) Masterson is listed as a Revolutionary War Soldier and a charter member of Mt. Zion Christian Church when it was formed in 1822. Other founding members were Masterson's sons', and in laws', the Harris's. Newspaper articles have indicated, Masterson was a Revolutionary War Veteran, and Masterson family descendants have identified a John Masterson's 1832 pension & Military Service Record, but have not concluded a definite burial spot. Clay Township, Section 12, Church Cemetery, near Golf Course.

**Henry Shaw-**Listed on 1940 Courthouse Plaque. Information Unknown. \*

**Joab Garrett-** (1764-1837) Garrett Cemetery; Ohio Twp.; Section 8; 3 1/2 miles North of Ohio River, East side of State Highway 231, on CR 350 S, on hill north

side of county broad.

Non Military Tombstone, states "American Revolutionary Soldier", Unproven. Very Possible.

## Other Revolutionary War burial possibilities

**Barnabas Miller-**

**William McCoy Sr.-** McCoy Family Descendants believe him to be buried on old Moffit Farm, Luce Twp. Rockport Journal Oct. 31, 1930. Unmarked Burial. Dowsing indicated burials.

**Nicholas Miller-** Unknown Burial

**Samuel Findley-** Applied for Revolutionary War Pension, Nov. 1836, from Eleazer Young's home, Ohio Twp. (Informed)

**AtheMeeks-** Family genealogy states Athe joined the South Caroline Militia, and was in the Battle of Kings Mountain. Unproven Article taken from the Rockport Journal Dec. 2, 1921

In a reply letter, C. F. Posson, Chairman of the Society Committee on Patriot Markers states:

The pension lists of 1835 show seven pensioners of the Revolutionary War residing in Spencer County in that year. Their names are as follows: Thomas Blair, David Chancellor, Lodowick Davis, Abraham Hornback, James Pollard, Henry Shaw, and Thomas Turnham. The pension list of 1840 shows two of these patriots were still residing in Spencer County, David Chancellor, aged 84, residing with John Smith, and Lodowick Davis aged 76 years and was head of family.

In addition to these two, the 1840 pension list shows two others not given in the list of 1835. They are Zachariah Briant/Bryant, aged 75, head of family, and Nicholas Miller, aged 77, residing with Barney Miller.
