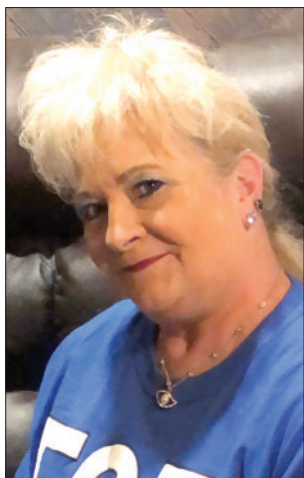
Deborah Kay Froggett, 68

Before There Were Words

The Gospel of John begins with this metaphysical equation of God with “the Word,” who it becomes clear shortly thereafter, is Jesus.
