

### Maxine Lobb Judd, 96

Maxine Lobb Judd of Greensburg, daughter of the late Leslie Harry "L.H." Lobb and Bertha Lou McKinney Lobb, was born July 23, 1929 in the Lobb Bend Community of Green County and departed this life March 20, 2026 at Green River Trails Nursing Home. She was 96 years, 7 months, and 28 days of age.

Maxine served for approximately 10 years with the Department of the Army at Fort Knox, Kentucky, under the former Directorate of Information and Operations, Ordinance Detachment (DIO-Ordinance), and U.S. Army MEDDAC, Medical Research Section at the Ireland Army Community Hospital. After leaving the Department of the Army, she was a housewife and seamstress until beginning her career as a teacher in Green County in 1969.

"Ms. Maxine" (as she was affectionately known by her students and co-workers), was a retired teacher from Green County Schools after 51 years. Ms. Maxine received the Head Start Employee of the Year for the 1988-89 school year, and in 1990-91 school year, became the Kentucky Head Start Teacher of the Year School Year, and Region IV Teacher of the Year (covering 8 southeastern states), receiving her award at Tunica, Mississippi. She was also commissioned a Kentucky Colonel January 2, 2014.

Maxine was a graduate of Greensburg High School, and Campbellsville University, with additional studies at the University of North

Carolina at Greensboro, the University of Kentucky, Western Kentucky University, Eastern Kentucky University, Morehead State University, Lindsey Wilson College, and Somerset Community College.

Maxine had made a profession of faith in Christ at age 11 at Brush Creek Baptist Church and was baptized in Brush Creek with her brothers Ralph and Robert. She was a member of the oldest member of the Greensburg Baptist Church at the time of her death, where she was an active member until her illness in 2024. She had taught Sunday School and VBS at Macedonia Baptist Church in Green County from 1952 until 1964, and at Greensburg Baptist Church from 1964 until the late 1990's. She also led various children's mission groups from the mid 1960's through the 1980's.

She was united in marriage to Earl Damon Judd Dec. 22, 1951, who preceded her in death Nov. 28, 2006.

She is survived by her son: Mark Judd of Greensburg; her daughter and son-

in-law: Connie Judd Hansford and Frank of Campbellsville; two grandchildren: Ryan W. Shuffett and Lindsey of Greensburg, Logan Hansford and Alexandria of Campbellsville; two great-grandchildren: Ashton W. Shuffett, Mia Faye Shuffett both of Greensburg; and a host of nieces, nephews, other relatives, and friends.

Besides her parents and husband, she was also preceded in death by 12 brothers and sisters: Lester Ping Lobb, Ralph E. Lobb, Robert Russell Lobb, Lemuel Harry Lobb, Boyce A. Edwards, Pelman Edwards, Elsie Jane Sickles, Anna Lou Addington, Ila J. Judd, Laura Lorene Jewell, Nellie M. Milby, and an infant sister, Chrystie Evelyn Edwards.

Funeral services were held Monday, March 23, 2026 at the Cowherd and Parrott Funeral Home with burial in Macedonia Cemetery. Bro. Blake Jessie officiated.

Visitation was Sunday and Monday at the funeral home.

The following obituary was published in the Green County Record on August 25, 1911:

Died on Saturday, Aug. 19th, 1911, at his late home, in this city, Braxton Everard Courts, Sr., of age's infirmities, aged 85 years, two months and two days.

He was born in Barren County, Ky., June 17, 1826, and moved to Iowa in early life by way of Nauvoo, Ill., where the Mormon leaders were in trouble. He came southeast to St. Louis, Mo., where he resided with an uncle and later came to Greensburg at about 19 years of age and entered the employ of Mr. Joe Durham, known as "Across the River Joe," and while with him mastered the saddlery trade, in which business he embarked for himself and successfully conducted for years.

April 2, 1850, he married Miss Eliza J. Durham, with whom he lived happily until her death a few years ago. To this union were born seven children, of whom the oldest, James J., and Braxton E. Jr., survive him; one died in infancy, followed later by others in the order named Margaret, William, John, and Mary. He leaves nine grandchildren and five great grandchildren.

He professed religion early in life and joined the Cumberland Presbyterian Church and later joined the Greensburg Presbyterian Church, of which he was an elder and the only surviving Trustee

until his death. He was a member of Greensburg Chapter No. 36 and has been a Mason about 60 years.

During the troubled years of the early '60s-1864, he served the county faithfully and fearlessly as Sheriff and had to make many quick changes from the usual route to save the people's money from the hands of the despoilers. He proved his worth and efficiency by being, even in those strenuous times, the first Sheriff of the State to receive his quietus from the State taxes for that year.

He has lived a consistent Christian life and throughout a long business career has been thorough and unswervingly honest building thereby a reputation for integrity by his own unaided efforts that many may envy. He was a good husband and father, a steadfast friend, a kind neighbor, a conscientious church member, and a grand law-abiding order lov-

ing citizen. Not one derogatory breath can be raised against him and he leaves a memory that can ever be revered with pride.

He was buried Sunday, the service at the Presbyterian Church being conducted by Rev. W. H. C. Sandidge, who delivered a most feeling and sympathetic address, after which the Masonic fraternity took charge and his remains were reverently laid to rest in the Greensburg Cemetery with the rites of the order so ably exemplified by Acting-Master J. D. Wilson in the presence of the largest representation of Masons, four lodges in other districts sending delegates, and one of the largest assemblages of citizens ever gathered in this place at a funeral. He held the respect of all even in death, and the pastor's remark "May our end be like his," is a tribute to the life and death of this grand old self-made man.
