Because of her teaching position and also because she was on her high school track team, she knows it is important for children to get plenty of exercise but also become aware of people who may look a little different. “Last year, the goal of helping five children from Kentucky to attend Camp No Limits last Summer was met,” Henderson said. That makes a total

of 11 campers that this event has supported in the two years it has been in existence.
