

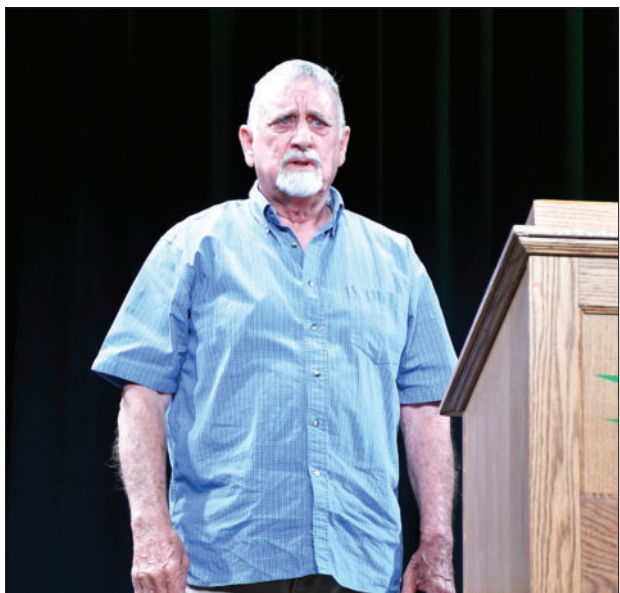
Republican candidates speak to community



John Frank, who is currently the county judge-executive and is seeking reelection, listed the accomplishments that have occurred under his leadership, including a new factory, grocery store, bike and walking trail, miles and miles of road resurfacing and a new spec building that is under construction.



James Bonta, candidate for county-judge executive, said that his platform is based on three things—communication transparency, common sense decision-making and his drive, dedication and compassion. His background is in agriculture, which he called the backbone of the country.



Terry Aaron, candidate for magistrate in the 4th District, told the listeners that it had been an honor to serve them as a magistrate and expressed appreciation to his family and friends who had supported him.



Andrew Hedgespeth, candidate for magistrate in the 4th District, explained that this is his first political race and that he wants to be a voice for the youth in the community.



Heather Moss, candidate for magistrate in the 3rd District, spoke of her commitment to serving others and wants to build a stronger future for Green County.



Jason "Farmer" Milby, candidate for magistrate in the 3rd District, said that he is supportive of local and state government and wants Green County to keep moving forward.



Garrett Milby, candidate for magistrate in the 3rd District, said that his experience in workforce development and leadership is an asset and that he believes Green County is a sleeping giant.



Steve Caven, candidate for State Representative in the 24th District, described himself as a leader but relies on communication as a way to serve others and that he wants to bring more local jobs to the area. He has an educational background in Green and Hart counties.



Ryan Bivens, the 24th District Representative, said that his farming experience prepared him to represent the people of this district. He said that in the state House of Representative, the difference is not between Republicans and Democrats but between urban and rural people.
