When the man died, the legal system was stumped as to how to honor this request. Eventually, after much discussion, the decision was made: The best way to fulfill the farmers's wishes was to let the weeds and briars take over the farmland, to allow the house and barn to go unpainted and eventually rot, and to allow the soil to erode and wash away. In summary, the court declared, "The best way to let the devil have possession of anything is to do nothing."

Nothing is not an option. There's a battle going on for the souls of those you love and you need to do everything in your power to make sure they end up on the winning side, entering that narrow gate, the one that offers abundant life now and eternal life thereafter.

Jesus followed up His warning of end times coldness with these words: "But the one who endures to the end, he will be saved" (Matthew 24:13 NASB). Paul adds

"Let us not lose heart in doing good, for in due time we will reap if we do not grow weary" (Galatians 6:9 NASB).
