

From Gresham to Columbia: Lovie's Story



Lovie Leftwich, born September 29, 1896, in the Gresham section of Green County, was the third daughter of John Taylor and Nora Bird Leftwich, a young farming couple raising a growing family at the turn of the century. The 1900 census lists little Lovie, age three, alongside older sisters Clara and Alta and baby sister Pernie. By 1910, the household had grown, with younger siblings Chandler, Naomi, and Maple joining the bustling home.

The Leftwich family remained anchored in the Gresham community where Lovie and her siblings grew up.

Her life changed in September 1927. At age 28, Lovie married Caleb Dohoney Caldwell, an Adair County farmer and World War I veteran. Their wedding, performed by Rev. Lee Pendleton, was memorable enough to make the local news. The ceremony took place in a car on the newly completed Greensburg Road between Greensburg and Columbia, near Gresham. Witnesses were Misses Sallie and Cecil Caldwell and Mr. Lura Lisle. The newlyweds originally made their home with Caleb's mother, Mrs. Etta Caldwell.

The Caldwells built their life in the Milltown community of Adair County, just over the Green County line, where farming and community involvement shaped their days. Lovie became known for her homemaking skills, winning fair prizes for canned goods and handmade sewing, and for her willingness to pitch in at local events. In 1939, she served as a judge at

the Greensburg School Fair, helping select winners in beauty, hog calling, chicken calling, and even husband calling contests.

Their daughter, Willie Kathryn Caldwell, born in 1931, quickly became the center of their world. At just five years old, Willie Catherine charmed audiences with a recitation at Ebenezer Church, earning enthusiastic applause from a large audience and a proud mention in the Columbia newspaper.

In 1945, Caleb purchased a nice 6-room home on Campbellsville Road (Hwy 55). He, Lovie, their daughter, and Etta Caldwell made them move in March to one mile north of Columbia. Caleb worked buying and selling cattle in the stockyard industry.

Lovie miraculously escaped injury in 1953 when a severe storm lifted the family's garage from its foundation and set it down in a nearby field while she was inside.

Their daughter mar-

ried William H. "Billy" Sandusky in 1953. The couple went on to have one son, David, and one daughter, Kathy, beginning another generation of the family's line.

Lovie and Caleb sold their home on Hwy 55 in 1967, moving then to 425 Young Street in Columbia.

Caleb passed away in 1975, remembered as a veteran, farmer, and respected member of the community. Lovie lived many more years in Columbia and eventually at Summit Manor Nursing Home. In 1990, she was remembered in the local newspaper when loved ones visited with flowers to celebrate her 94th birthday.

Lovie Leftwich Caldwell passed away on January 8, 1992, at age 95 and was laid to rest in Columbia Cemetery, beside the husband with whom she spent nearly fifty years. She left behind her daughter, grandchildren, great grandchildren, and a long line of extended family in Adair and Green counties.

Small Habits Shape A Stronger Financial Future



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Financial security doesn't have to come from a big salary, a lucky investment or some dramatic turning point.
